

1--Mr. Dufresne, describe
2--the confrontation you had with your wife the night she was murdered.
3--It was very bitter.
4--She said she was glad I knew,that she hated all the sneaking around.
5--And she said that she wanted a divorce in Reno.
6---What was your response? -I told her I would not grant one.
7--"I'll see you in hell before I see you in Reno."
8--Those were your words, according to your neighbors.
9--If they say so.
10--I really don't remember. I was upset.
11--What happened after you argued with your wife?
12--She packed a bag.
13--She packed a bag to go and stay with Mr. Quentin.
14--Glenn Quentin, golf pro at the Snowden Hills Country Club
15--whom you had discovered was your wife's lover.
16--Did you follow her?
17--I went to a few bars first.
18--Later, I drove to his house to confront them. They weren't home.
19--I parked in the turnout
20--and waited.
21--With what intention?
22--I'm not sure.
23--I was confused
24--drunk.
25--I think
26--mostly I wanted to scare them.
27--When they arrived, you went up to the house and murdered them.
28--No, I was sobering up.
29--I got back in the car and I drove home to sleep it off.
30--Along the way, I threw my gun into the Royal River.
31--I've been very clear on this point.
32--I get hazy where the cleaning woman shows up the following morning
33--and finds your wife in bed with her lover
34--riddled with.38-caliber bullets.
35--Does that strike you as a fantastic coincidence, or is it just me?
36--Yes, it does.
37--Yet you still maintain you threw your gun into the river
38--before the murders took place.
39--That's very convenient.
40--It's the truth.
41--The police dragged that river for three days, and nary a gun was found
42--so no comparison could be made
43--between your gun and the bullets
44--taken from the bloodstained corpses of the victims.

45--And that also
46--is very convenient. Isn't it, Mr. Dufresne?
47--Since I am innocent of this crime
48--I find it decidedly inconvenient that the gun was never found.
49--Ladies and gentlemen, you've heard all the evidence.
50--We have the accused at the scene of the crime. We have footprints.
51--Bullets on the ground bearing his fingerprints.
52--A broken bourbon bottle, likewise with fingerprints.
53--And most of all
54--we have a beautiful young woman and her lover
55--lying dead in each other's arms.
56--They had sinned.
57--But was their crime so great
58--as to merit a death sentence?
59--While you think about that
60--think about this:
61--A revolver holds six bullets, not eight.
62--I submit that this was not a hot-blooded crime of passion.
63--That at least could be understood, if not condoned.
64--No.
65--This was revenge
66--of a much more brutal, cold-blooded nature. Consider this:
67--Four bullets per victim.
68--Not six shots fired, but eight.
69--That means that he fired the gun empty
70--and then stopped to reload
71--Screenplay: Frank Darabont
72--so that he could shoot each of them again. An extra bullet per lover
73--right in the head.
74--You strike me as a particularly icy and remorseless man, Mr. Dufresne.
75--It chills my blood just to look at you.
76--By the power vested in me by the state of Maine
77--Producer: Niki Marvin
78--I hereby order you to serve two life sentences back-to-back
79--one for each of your victims. So be it!
80--Director: Frank Darabont
81--Sit.
82--We see you've served 20 years of a life sentence?
83---Yes, sir. -You feel you've been rehabilitated?
84--Yes, sir. Absolutely, sir.
85--I mean, I learned my lesson.
86--I can honestly say that I'm a changed man.
87--I'm no longer a danger to society.
88--That's God's honest truth.

89--Reject.
90--Hey, Red.
91--How'd it go?
92--Same old shit, different day.
93--Yeah, I know how you feel.
94--I'm up for rejection next week.
95--Yeah, I got rejected last week.
96--It happens.
97--Hey, Red, bump me a deck.
98--Get out of my face, man! You're into me for five packs already.
99---Four! -Five!
100--There must be a con like me in every prison in America.
101--I'm the guy who can get it for you.
102--Cigarettes, a bag of reefer, if that's your thing
103--bottle of brandy to celebrate your kid's high school graduation.
104--Damn near anything within reason.
105--Yes, sir! I'm a regular Sears and Roebuck.
106--So when Andy Dufresne came to me in 1949
107--and asked me to smuggle Rita Hayworth into the prison for him
108--I told him, "No problem."
109--to the main gate
110--to the main gate
111--Andy came to Shawshank Prison
112--in early 1947 for murdering his wife and the fella she was banging.
113--On the outside, he'd been vice president of a large Portland bank.
114--Good work for a man so young.
115--Here Red
116--You speak English, butt-steak?
117--You follow this officer.
118--I never seen such a sorry-looking heap of maggot shit in all my life.
119--Hey, fish! Come over here!
120--Taking bets today, Red?
121--Smokes or coin? Bettor's choice.
122--Smokes. Put me down for two.
123--All right, who's your horse?
124--That little sack of shit.
125---Eighth. He'll be first. -Bullshit! I'll take that action.
126--You're out some smokes, son.
127--If you're so smart, you call it.
128--I'll take that chubby fat-ass there.
129--The fifth one. Put me down for a quarter deck.
130--Fresh fish today!
131--We're reeling them in!
132--I admit I didn't think much of Andy first time I laid eyes on him.

133--Looked like a stiff breeze would blow him over.
134--That was my first impression of the man.
135--What do you say?
136--That tall drink of water with the silver spoon up his ass.
137--That guy? Never happen.
138---10 cigarettes. -That's a rich bet.
139--Who's going to prove me wrong?
140--Heywood? Jigger?
141--Skeets?
142--Floyd!
143--Four brave souls.
144--Return to your cellblocks for evening count.
145--All prisoners, return to your cellblocks.
146--Turn to the right!
147--Eyes front.
148--This is Mr. Hadley. He's captain of the guards.
149--I'm Mr. Norton, the warden.
150--You are convicted felons.
151--That's why they've sent you to me.
152--Rule number one:
153--No blasphemy.
154--I'll not have the Lord's name taken in vain in my prison.
155--The other rules
156--you'll figure out as you go along. Any questions?
157--When do we eat?
158--You eat when we say you eat.
159--You shit when we say you shit, and piss when we say you piss.
160--You got that, you maggot-dick motherfucker?
161--On your feet.
162--I believe in two things:
163--Discipline and the Bible.
164--Here, you'll receive both.
165--Put your trust in the Lord.
166--Your ass belongs to me.
167--Welcome to Shawshank.
168--Unhook them.
169--Turn around.
170--That's enough.
171--Move to the end of the cage.
172--Turn around. Delouse him.
173--Turn around.
174--Move out of the cage. Pick up your clothes and Bible.
175--Next man up!
176--To the right.

177--Right. Right.
178--Left.
179--The first night's the toughest. No doubt about it.
180--They march you in naked as the day you were born
181--skin burning and half-blind from that delousing shit.
182--And when they put you in that cell
183--and those bars slam home
184--that's when you know it's for real.
185--Old life blown away in the blink of an eye.
186--Nothing left but all the time in the world to think about it.
187--Most new fish come close to madness the first night.
188--Somebody always breaks down crying.
189--Happens every time.
190--The only question is
191--who's it going to be?
192--It's as good a thing to bet on as any, I guess.
193--I had my money on Andy Dufresne.
194--Lights out!
195--I remember my first night.
196--Seems like a long time ago.
197--Hey, fish.
198--Fish, fish.
199--What are you, scared of the dark?
200--Bet you wish your daddy never fucked your mama!
201--Piggy! Pork! I want me a pork chop.
202--The boys always go fishing with first-timers.
203--And they don't quit till they reel someone in.
204--Hey, Fat Ass.
205--Fat Ass!
206--Talk to me, boy.
207--I know you're there. I can hear you breathing.
208--Don't you listen to these nitwits, you hear me?
209--This place ain't so bad.
210--Tell you what
211--I'll introduce you around, make you feel right at home.
212--I know a couple of big old bull queers that'd just
213--love to make your acquaintance.
214--Especially that big, white, mushy butt of yours.
215--God!
216--I don't belong here!
217---We have a winner! -I want to go home!
218--And it's Fat Ass by a nose!
219--Fresh fish!
220--I don't belong here

221--I want to go home!
222--I want my mother!
223--I had your mother! She wasn't that great!
224--What the Christ is this horseshit?
225--He blasphemed. I'll tell the warden.
226--You'll tell him with my baton up your ass!
227--Let me out!
228--What is your malfunction, you fat barrel of monkey spunk?
229--Please! I ain't supposed to be here.
230--Not me!
231--I won't count to three. Not even to one.
232--You shut up, or I'll sing you a lullaby!
233--Shut up, man. Shut up!
234--You don't understand. I'm not supposed to be here.
235--Open that cell.
236--Me neither! They run this place like a fucking prison!
237--Son of a bitch!
238--Captain, take it easy!
239--If I hear so much as a mouse fart in here tonight
240--I swear by God and Jesus, you will all visit the infirmary.
241--Every last motherfucker in here.
242--Call the trustees. Take that tub of shit down to the infirmary.
243--His first night in the joint, Dufresne cost me two packs of cigarettes.
244--He never made a sound.
245--Tier 3 north, clear count!
246--Tier 2 north, clear count.
247--Tier 3 south, clear.
248--Tier 1 south, clear.
249--Tier 4 south, clear.
250--Prepare to roll out.
251--Roll out!
252--Are you going to eat that?
253--I hadn't planned on it.
254--Do you mind?
255--That's nice and ripe.
256--Jake says thank you.
257--Fell out of his nest over by the plate shop.
258--I'm going to look after him until he's big enough to fly.
259--Oh, no! Here he comes.
260--Morning, fellas.
261--Fine morning, isn't it?
262--You know why it's a fine morning, don't you?
263--Send them down. I want them lined up
264--just like a pretty little chorus line.

265--Look at that.
266---I can't stand this guy. -Oh, Lord!
267--Yes! Richmond, Virginia.
268--Smell my ass!
269--After he smells mine.
270--That's a shame about your horse coming in last and all.
271--But I sure do love that winning horse of mine, though.
272--I owe that boy a big kiss when I see him.
273--Why don't you give him some of your cigarettes instead? Lucky fuck!
274--Hey, Tyrell.
275--You pull infirmary duty this week?
276--How's my horse doing anyway?
277--Dead.
278--Hadley busted his head up pretty good.
279--Doc had gone home for the night.
280--Poor bastard lay there till this morning.
281--By then, there wasn't nothing we could do.
282--What was his name?
283--What'd you say?
284--I was just wondering if anyone knew his name.
285--What the fuck do you care, new fish?
286--Doesn't fucking matter what his name was. He's dead.
287--Anybody come at you yet?
288--Anybody get to you yet?
289--Hey, we all need friends in here.
290--I could be a friend to you.
291--Hard to get.
292--I like that.
293--Andy kept pretty much to himself at first.
294--I guess he had a lot on his mind
295--trying to adapt to life on the inside.
296--Wasn't until a month went by before he opened his mouth
297--to say more than two words to somebody.
298--As it turned out
299--that somebody was me.
300--I'm Andy Dufresne.
301--Wife-killing banker.
302--Why'd you do it?
303--I didn't, since you ask.
304--You're going to fit right in.
305--Everybody in here's innocent. Didn't you know that?
306---What you in here for? -Didn't do it. Lawyer fucked me.
307--Rumor has it you're a real cold fish.
308--You think your shit smells sweeter than most. Is that right?

309--What do you think?

310--To tell you the truth, I haven't made up my mind.

311--I understand you're a man that knows how to get things.

312--I'm known to locate certain things from time to time.

313--I wonder if you might get me a rock hammer.

314--What?

315--A rock hammer.

316---What is it and why? -What do you care?

317--For a toothbrush, I wouldn't ask. I'd quote a price.

318--But a toothbrush is a non-lethal object, isn't it?

319--Fair enough.

320--A rock hammer is about six or seven inches long.

321---Looks like a miniature pickax. -Pickax?

322--For rocks.

323--Quartz?

324--Quartz

325--And some mica, shale

326--limestone.

327--So?

328--So I'm a rock hound.

329--At least I was in my old life. I'd like to be again.

330--Or maybe you'd like to sink your toy into somebody's skull.

331--No, I have no enemies here.

332--No? Wait a while.

333--Word gets around.

334--The Sisters have taken quite a liking to you.

335--Especially Bogs.

336--Don't suppose it would help if I told them I'm not homosexual.

337--Neither are they.

338--You have to be human first. They don't qualify.

339--Bull queers take by force. That's all they want or understand.

340--If I were you, I'd grow eyes in the back of my head.

341---Thanks for the advice. -Well, that's free.

342--You understand my concern.

343--If there's trouble, I won't use the rock hammer.

344--Then I'd guess you want to escape. Tunnel under the wall, maybe.

345--What did I miss? What's so funny?

346--You'll understand when you see the rock hammer.

347--What's an item like this usually go for?

348--Seven dollars in any rock-and-gem shop.

349--My normal markup's 20 percent.

350--But this is a specialty item.

351--Risk goes up, price goes up. Let's make it an even 10 bucks.

352--Ten it is.

353--Waste of money, if you ask me.
354--Why's that?
355--Folks around this joint love surprise inspections.
356--They find it, you're going to lose it.
357--If they catch you, you don't know me.
358--Mention my name, we never do business again.
359--Not for shoelaces or a stick of gum. Now you got that?
360--I understand.
361--Thank you, Mr
362--Red.
363--Name's Red.
364--Red
365--Why do they call you that?
366--Maybe it's because I'm Irish.
367--I could see why some of the boys took him for snobby.
368--He had a quiet way about him
369--a walk and a talk that just wasn't normal around here.
370--He strolled
371--like a man in the park without a care or a worry in the world.
372--Like he had on an invisible coat that would shield him from this place.
373--yes
374--I think it'd be fair to say
375--I liked Andy from the start.
376--Let's go! Some of us got a schedule to keep.
377--Move it! Come on, move it!
378--How you doing? How's the wife treating you?
379--keep moving
380--just go
381--Red
382--Andy was right.
383--I finally got the joke.
384--It would take a man about 600 years
385--to tunnel under the wall with one of these.
386---Book? -Not today.
387---Book? -No.
388--Book
389--Delivery for Dufresne.
390--Book?
391--Book?
392--Dufresne
393--Here's your book.
394--Thanks.
395--We're running low on hexite. Get on back and fetch us up some.
396--This will blind you.

397--Honey, hush.
398--That's it. You fight!
399--Better that way.
400--I wish I could tell you Andy fought the good fight
401--and the Sisters let him be.
402--I wish I could tell you that
403--but prison is no fairy-tale world.
404--He never said who did it.
405--But we all knew.
406--Things went on like that for a while.
407--Prison life consists of routine
408--and then more routine.
409--Every so often, Andy would show up with fresh bruises.
410--The Sisters kept at him.
411--Sometimes he was able to fight them off.
412--Sometimes not.
413--And that's how it went for Andy.
414--That was his routine.
415--I do believe those first two years were the worst for him.
416--And I also believe that if things had gone on that way
417--this place would have got the best of him.
418--But then, in the spring of 1949
419--the powers that be decided:
420--The roof of the license-plate factory needs resurfacing.
421--I need a dozen volunteers for a week's work.
422--As you know
423--special detail carries with it special privileges.
424--It was outdoor detail
425--and May is one damned fine month to be working outdoors.
426--Stay in line there.
427--More than a hundred men volunteered for the job.
428--Wallace E. Unger.
429--Ellis Redding.
430--Wouldn't you know it?
431--Me and some fellows I know were among the names called.
432--Andrew Dufresne.
433--It only cost us a pack of smokes per man.
434--I made my usual 20 percent, of course.
435--So this big-shot lawyer calls me long-distance from Texas.
436--I say, "Yeah?"
437--He says, "Sorry to inform you, but your brother just died."
438---I'm sorry to hear that. -I'm not. He was an asshole.
439--Ran off years ago. Figured him for dead.
440--So this lawyer fellow says to me:

441--"He died a rich man." Oil wells and shit. Close to a million bucks.
442--A million bucks?
443---Incredible how lucky some assholes get. -You going to see any of that?
444--Thirty-five thousand. That's what he left me.
445---Dollars? -Yep
446--That's great! That's like winning the sweepstakes.
447--Isn't it?
448--Dumb shit, what do you think the government will do to me?
449--Take a big wet bite out of my ass is what.
450--Poor Byron.
451--Terrible fucking luck, huh? Crying shame.
452--Some people really got it awful.
453--Andy, are you nuts?
454--IKeep your eyes on your mop, man!
455--You'll pay some tax, but you'll still end up
456--Yeah, maybe enough to buy a new car, and then what?
457--I got to pay tax on the car. Repair
458--maintenance, kids pestering you to take them for a ride all the time.
459--Then if you figure your tax wrong, you pay out of your own pocket.
460--I tell you! Uncle Sam!
461--He puts his hand in your shirt and squeezes your tit till it's purple.
462--Andy
463---Getting himself killed. -I Keep tarring.
464--Some brother. Shit!
465--Mr. Hadley
466--do you trust your wife?
467--Oh, that's funny.
468--You'll look funnier sucking my dick with no teeth.
469--What I mean is, do you think she'd go behind your back?
470--Step aside, Mert. This fucker's having himself an accident.
471--He'll push him off!
472--If you trust her, you can keep
473--that 35,000.
474---What did you say? -Thirty-five thousand.
475--All of it.
476---Every penny. -You better start making sense.
477--If you want to keep it, give it to your wife.
478--The IRS allows a one-time-only gift to your spouse for up to \$ 60,000.
479---Bullshit. Tax-free? -Tax-free.
480--IRS can't touch one cent.
481--You're that smart banker that killed his wife.
482--Why should I believe you? So I can end up in here with you?
483--It's legal. Ask the IRS. They'll say the same thing.
484--I feel stupid telling you this. I'm sure you would have investigated.

485--I don't need you to tell me where the bear shit in the buckwheat.
486--Of course not. But you do need someone to set it up for you.
487--That'll cost you. A lawyer.
488--A bunch of ball-washing bastards!
489--I suppose I could set it up for you. That would save you some money.
490--You get the forms, I'll prepare them
491--nearly free of charge.
492--I'd only ask three beers apiece for each of my coworkers.
493--"Coworkers." That's rich!
494--A man working outdoors feels more like a man
495--if he can have a bottle of suds. That's only my opinion
496--sir.
497--What are you jimmies staring at?
498--Let's go! Work!
499--And that's how it came to pass
500--that on the second-to-last day of the job
501--the convict crew that tarred the factory roof in the spring of '49
502--wound up sitting in a row at 10:00 in the morning
503--drinking icy-cold beer, courtesy of the hardest screw
504--that ever walked a turn at Shawshank State Prison.
505--Drink up while it's cold, ladies.
506--The colossal prick even managed to sound magnanimous.
507--We sat and drank with the sun on our shoulders and felt like free men.
508--We could have been tarring the roof of one of our own houses.
509--We were the lords of all creation.
510--As for Andy
511--he spent that break hunkered in the shade
512--a strange little smile on his face
513--watching us drink his beer.
514--Want a cold one?
515--No, thanks. I gave up drinking.
516--You could argue he done it to curry favor with the guards.
517--Or maybe make a few friends among us cons.
518--Me?
519--I think he did it just to feel normal again
520--if only for a short while.
521--IKing me.
522---Chess. Now there's a game of kings. -What?
523--Civilized. Strategic.
524--And a total fucking mystery. I hate it.
525--Let me teach you someday.
526--Sure.
527--We could get a board together.
528--You're talking to the right man. I can get things, right?

529--We might do business on a board, and I'll carve the pieces myself.
530--One side in alabaster, one in soapstone. What do you think?
531--I think it'll take years.
532--Years I got. What I don't have are the rocks.
533--Pickings are pretty slim in the yard.
534--Pebbles, mostly.
535--We're getting to be kind of friends, aren't we?
536--Yeah, I guess.
537--Can I ask you something?
538--Why'd you do it?
539--I'm innocent, Red.
540--Just like everybody else here.
541--What are you in for?
542--Murder. Same as you.
543--Innocent?
544--Only guilty man in Shawshank.
545--Peter
546--Benny
547--A
548--Where's the canary?
549--How did you know?
550---How did I know what? -So you don't know.
551--Come.
552--This is where the canary is.
553--Quite a surprise to hear a woman singing in my house, eh?
554--That's quite a
555--surprise.
556--Red
557--Wait, wait.
558--Here she comes.
559--I like this part when she does that shit with her hair.
560--I know. I've seen it three times this month.
561--Gilda, are you decent?
562--Me?
563--God, I love it.
564--I understand you're a man that knows how to get things.
565--I'm known to locate certain things from time to time. What do you want?
566---Rita Hayworth. -What?
567--Can you get her?
568--So this is Johnny Farrel. I've heard a lot about you.
569---Take a few weeks. -Weeks?
570--I don't have her stuffed down the front of my pants right now, sorry to say.
571--But I'll get her.
572--Relax.

573--Thanks.

574---Get out! -I got to change reels!

575--I said fuck off!

576--Ain't you going to scream?

577--Let's get this over with.

578--He broke my fucking nose!

579--Now

580--I'm going to open my fly

581--and you'll swallow what I give you to swallow.

582--Then you'll swallow Rooster's. You broke his nose.

583--He ought to have something to show for it.

584--You put it in my mouth, you lose it.

585--No, you don't understand.

586--Do that and I'll put all eight inches of this in your ear.

587--All right, but you should know that sudden, serious brain injury

588--causes the victim to bite down hard.

589--In fact, I hear the bite reflex is so strong

590--they have to pry the victim's jaws open

591--with a crowbar.

592--Where do you get this shit?

593--I read it.

594--You know how to read, you ignorant fuck?

595--Honey!

596--You shouldn't!

597--Bogs didn't put anything in Andy's mouth.

598--And neither did his friends.

599--What they did do is beat him within an inch of his life.

600--Andy spent a month in the infirmary.

601--Bogs spent a week in the hole.

602--Time's up, Bogs.

603--It's your world, boss.

604--Return to your cellblocks for evening count.

605--All prisoners report for lock down.

606--What?

607---Where's he going? -Grab his ankles.

608--No help!

609--Two things never happened again after that.

610--The Sisters never laid a finger on Andy again.

611--And Bogs would never walk again.

612--They transferred him to a minimum-security hospital upstate.

613--To my knowledge, he lived out the rest of his days

614--drinking his food through a straw.

615--Andy could use a nice welcome back when he gets out of the infirmary.

616--Sounds good to us.

617--I figure we owe him that much for the beer.
618--The man likes to play chess.
619--Let's get him some rocks.
620--Guys!
621--I got one.
622--I got one. Look!
623--Heywood, that isn't soapstone! And it ain't alabaster either.
624--What are you, a fucking geologist?
625--He's right. It ain't.
626---What the hell is it then? -It's a horse apple.
627---Bullshit! -No, horseshit.
628--Petrified.
629--God
630--Damn!
631--Despite a few hitches, the boys came through in fine style.
632--And by the weekend he was due back
633--we had enough rocks saved up to keep him busy till rapture.
634--Also got a big shipment in that week.
635--Cigarettes
636--chewing gum
637--sipping whisky
638--playing cards with naked ladies on them. You name it.
639--And of course, the most important item:
640--Rita Hayworth herself.
641--No Charge. Welcome Back.
642--Wake up
643--Heads up. They're tossing cells.
644--Heads up. They're tossing cells!
645--119.
646--123.
647--Bible
648--On your feet.
649--Face the wall.
650--Turn around and face the warden.
651--Pleased to see you reading this.
652--Any favorite passages?
653--"Watch ye, therefore, for ye know not
654--when the master of the house cometh."
655--Mark 13:35.
656--I've always liked that one.
657--But I prefer
658--"I am the light of the world.
659--Ye that followeth me shall have the light of life."
660--John, chapter 8, verse 12.

661--I hear you're good with numbers.
662--How nice.
663--Man should have a skill.
664--Explain this.
665--It's called a rock blanket. It's for shaping and polishing rocks.
666--A little hobby of mine.
667--It's pretty clean.
668--Some contraband here, but nothing to get in a twist over.
669--I can't say I approve of this.
670--But I suppose
671--exceptions can be made.
672--Lock them up!
673--I almost forgot.
674--I'd hate to deprive you of this.
675--Salvation lies within.
676--Yes, sir.
677--Tossing cells was just an excuse.
678--Truth is
679--Norton wanted to size Andy up.
680--His Judgement Cometh and that Right Soon.
681--My wife made that in church group.
682--Very nice, sir.
683--You enjoy working the laundry?
684--No, sir. Not especially.
685--Perhaps we can find something more
686--befitting a man of your education.
687--Hey, Jake. Where's Brooks?
688--I thought I heard you out here.
689--I've been reassigned to you.
690--I know, they told me.
691--Ain't that a kick in the head?
692--Well, I'll give you the dime tour.
693--Come on.
694--Well, here she is.
695--The Shawshank Prison Library.
696--National Geographics
697--Reader's Digest condensed books
698--and Louis L'Amour.
699--Look magazine.
700--Erle Stanley Gardners.
701--Every evening I load up the cart and make my rounds.
702--I enter the names on this clipboard here.
703--Easy, peasy, Japanese-y.
704---Any questions? -How long have you been librarian?

705--I come here in '05, and they made me librarian in 1912.
706--And have you ever had an assistant?
707--No. Not much to it, really.
708--Why me? Why now?
709--I don't know.
710--But it'd be nice to have some company down here.
711--Dufresne
712--That's him. That's the one.
713--I'm Dekins.
714--I was thinking
715--about setting up some kind of trust fund for my kids' educations.
716--I see.
717--Why don't we have a seat and talk it over.
718--Do you have a piece of paper and a pencil?
719--Thanks.
720--So
721--Mister Dekins
722--And then Andy says, "Mr. Dekins
723--do you want your sons to go to Harvard or Yale?"
724--He didn't say that!
725--As God as my witness!
726--Dekins blinked for a second
727--then he laughed and actually shook Andy's hand.
728---My ass! -Shook his hand.
729--I tell you, I near soiled myself!
730--All he needed was a suit and tie and a jiggly hula gal on his desk
731--he'd have been "Mr. Dufresne," if you please.
732--Making a few friends?
733--I wouldn't say "friends."
734--I'm a convicted murderer who provides sound financial planning.
735--It's a wonderful pet to have.
736--Got you out of the laundry, though.
737--It might do more than that.
738--How about expanding the library. Get some new books.
739--If you ask for something, ask for a pool table.
740--yes
741--How do you expect to do that? I mean
742--get new books in here, "Mr. Dufresne, if you please."
743--I'll ask the warden for funds.
744--Six wardens have been through here in my tenure, and I've learned
745--one immutable, universal truth:
746--Not one born whose asshole
747--wouldn't pucker up tighter than a snare drum when you ask for funds.
748---The budget's stretched thin as it is. -I see.

749--Maybe I could write the state senate and request funds from them.
750--They have only three ways to spend the taxpayers' money for prisons:
751--More walls, more bars, more guards.
752--I'd like to try, with permission. A letter a week.
753---They can't ignore me forever. -Sure can.
754--But you write your letters if it makes you happy.
755--I'll even mail them for you. How's that?
756--So Andy started writing a letter a week
757--just like he said.
758--And like Norton said
759--Andy got no answers.
760--The following April, he did tax returns for half the guards at Shawshank.
761--Year after that, he did them all
762--including the warden's.
763--Year after that, they rescheduled the intramural season
764--to coincide with tax season.
765--The guards on the opposing teams all remembered to bring their W-2s.
766--So Moresby Prison
767--issued you a gun, but you paid for it.
768--Right. The holster too.
769--That's tax-deductible. You can write that off.
770--Yes, sir! Andy was a regular cottage industry.
771--In fact, it got so busy at tax time, he was allowed a staff.
772--Could you hand me a stack of 1040s?
773--Got me out of the wood shop a month out of the year, and that was fine by me.
774--And still, he kept sending those letters.
775--It's Brooks.
776--Watch the door.
777--Please, Brooks.
778---Calm the fuck down. -Stay back!
779---Stay back, goddamn it! -What's going on?
780--One second he's fine, then out come the knives.
781--We can talk about this, right?
782--There's nothing to talk about. I'll cut his fucking throat.
783--What's he done to you?
784--It's what they done!
785--I got no choice.
786--You won't hurt Heywood. We all know that.
787---Right, Heywood? -Sure.
788--He's a friend of yours, and Brooks is a reasonable man.
789---Right, guys? -Yes.
790--So put the knife down. Look at me.
791--Put the knife down.
792--Look at his neck, for God's sake.

793--Look at his neck. He's bleeding.
794--It's the only way
795--they'd let me stay.
796--This is crazy. You don't want to do this.
797--Put it, put it down.
798--Take it easy.
799--You'll be all right.
800--Him? What about me?
801--Crazy old fool damn near cut my throat!
802--You've had worse from shaving.
803--What did you do to set him off?
804--Nothing. I come in here to say farewell.
805--Ain't you heard? His parole's come through.
806--I just don't understand what happened in there.
807--Old man's crazy as a rat in a tin shithouse.
808--That's enough out of you.
809---Heard he had you shitting your pants. -Fuck you.
810--IKnock it off.
811--Brooks ain't no bug.
812--he is just
813--institutionalized.
814--"Institutionalized," my ass.
815--The man's been in here 50 years, Heywood, 50 years!
816--This is all he knows.
817--In here, he's an important man
818--an educated man.
819--Outside, he's nothing.
820--Just a used-up con with arthritis in both hands.
821--Probably couldn't get a library card if he tried.
822--You know what I'm trying to say?
823--I do believe you're talking out of your ass.
824--You believe whatever you want.
825--But I tell you these walls are funny.
826--First you hate them.
827--Then you get used to them.
828--Enough time passes
829--you get so you depend on them.
830--That's "institutionalized."
831--Shit.
832---I could never get like that. -Oh, yeah?
833--Wait till you've been here as long as Brooks.
834--Goddamn right.
835--They send you here for life
836--that's exactly what they take.

837--Part that counts, anyway.
838--I can't take care of you no more, Jake.
839--You go on now.
840--You're free.
841--You're free.
842--Good luck, Brooksie.
843--Dear fellas:
844--I can't believe how fast things move on the outside.
845--Watch it, old-timer! Want to get killed?
846--I saw an automobile once when I was a kid
847--but now they're everywhere.
848--The world went and got itself in a big damn hurry.
849--The parole board got me into this halfway house
850--called "The Brewer"
851--and a job
852--bagging groceries at the Food-Way.
853--It's hard work and I try to keep up
854---...but my hands hurt most of the time.
855--Make sure your man double-bags.
856--Last time, the bottom near came out.
857--Make sure you double-bag like the lady says. understand?
858--Yes, sir. Surely will.
859--I don't think the store manager likes me very much.
860--Sometimes after work, I go to the park and feed the birds.
861--I keep thinking
862--Jake might just show up and say hello.
863--But he never does.
864--I hope, wherever he is, he's doing okay and making new friends.
865--I have trouble sleeping at night.
866--I have bad dreams like I'm falling.
867--I wake up scared.
868--Sometimes it takes me a while to remember where I am.
869--Maybe I should get a gun and rob the Food-Way so they'd send me home.
870--I could shoot the manager while I was at it. Sort of like a bonus.
871--I guess I'm too old for that sort of nonsense anymore.
872--I don't like it here.
873--I'm tired of being afraid all the time. I've decided
874--not to stay.
875--I doubt they'll kick up any fuss
876--not for an old crook like me.
877--Brook was here
878--"I doubt they'll kick up any fuss, not for an old crook like me.
879--P.S. Tell Heywood I'm sorry I put a knife to his throat.
880--No hard feelings. Brooks."

881--He should have died in here.
882--What the fuck have you done?
883--It's a goddamn mess, I'll tell you that.
884---What's all this? -You tell me. They're addressed to you.
885--Take it.
886--"Dear Mr. Dufresne:
887--In response to your inquiries
888--the state has allocated the enclosed funds for your library project."
889--This is \$ 200.
890--"In addition, the library district has generously responded
891--with a donation of used books and sundries.
892--We trust this will fill your needs. We now consider the matter closed.
893--Please stop sending us letters."
894--Clear all this out before the warden gets back.
895--Yes, sir.
896--Good for you, Andy.
897--Wow!
898--It only took six years.
899--From now on, I'll write two letters a week instead of one.
900--I believe you're crazy enough. Get this stuff out
901--like he said.I've got to pinch a loaf.
902--When I come back
903--this is all gone, all right?
904--Jughead
905--Do you hear that?
906--Dufresne!
907--Andy, let me out!
908--Andy
909--I have no idea to this day what those two Italian ladies were singing about.
910--Truth is, I don't want to know.
911--Some things are best left unsaid.
912--I like to think it was something so beautiful
913--it can't be expressed in words
914--and makes your heart ache because of it.
915--I tell you, those voices soared
916--higher and farther than anybody in a gray place dares to dream.
917--It was like a beautiful bird flapped into our drab cage
918--and made those walls dissolve away.
919--And for the briefest of moments
920--every last man at Shawshank felt free.
921--It pissed the warden off something awful.
922--Open the door.
923--Open it up!
924--Dufresne, open this door!

925--Turn that off!
926--I am warning you. Turn that off!
927--Dufresne
928--You're mine now.
929--Andy got two weeks in the hole for that little stunt.
930--On your feet.
931---Hey, look who's here. -Maestro!
932--You couldn't play something good, huh? Like Hank Williams?
933--They broke the door down before I could take requests.
934---Was it worth two weeks? -Easiest time I ever did.
935---No such thing as easy time in the hole. -A week in the hole is like a year.
936---Damn straight. -I had Mr. Mozart to keep me company.
937--So they let you tote that record player down there, huh?
938--It was in here.
939--In here.
940--That's the beauty of music. They
941--can't get that from you.
942--Haven't you ever felt that way about music?
943--Well, I played a mean harmonica as a younger man.
944--Lost interest in it, though.
945--Didn't make much sense in here.
946--Here's where it makes the most sense.
947--You need it so you don't forget.
948--Forget?
949--Forget that there are
950--places
951--in the world that aren't made out of stone.
952--There's something
953--inside
954--that they can't get to
955--that they can't touch.
956--That's yours.
957--What are you talking about?
958--Hope.
959--Hope.
960--Let me tell you something, my friend.
961--Hope is a dangerous thing.
962--Hope can drive a man insane.
963--It's got no use on the inside.
964--You'd better get used to that idea.
965--Like Brooks did?
966--Sit down.
967--Says here that you've served 30 years of a life sentence.
968--You feel you've been rehabilitated?

969--Oh, yes, sir.
970--Without a doubt.
971--I can honestly say I'm a changed man.
972--No danger to society here.
973--God's honest truth.
974--Absolutely rehabilitated.
975--Reject.
976--Thirty years.
977--Jesus, when you say it like that
978--You wonder where it went.
979--I wonder where 10 years went.
980--Here.
981--A little parole rejection present.
982--Go ahead and open it.
983--Went through one of your competitors.
984--I hope you don't mind. I wanted it to be a surprise.
985--It's very pretty.
986--Thank you.
987--You going to play it?
988--No.
989--Not right now.
990--Roll in!
991--A New Girl For Your 10 Year Anniversary. Red.
992--Lights out!
993--Andy was as good as his word.
994--He wrote two letters a week instead of one.
995--In 1959, the state senate finally clued in to the fact
996--they couldn't buy him off with just a \$ 200 check.
997--Appropriations Committee voted an annual payment of \$500
998--just to shut him up.
999--And you'd be amazed how far Andy could stretch it.
1000--He made deals with book clubs, charity groups.
1001--He bought remaindered books by the pound
1002--Treasure Island.
1003--Robert Louis
1004--Stevenson.
1005--Fiction, adventure.
1006--What's next?
1007--I got here Auto Repair
1008--and Soap Carving.
1009--Trade skills and hobbies. Under "Educational," behind you.
1010--Count of Monte Crisco.
1011--That's "Cristo," you dumb shit.
1012--By Alexandree

1013--Dum-ass.
1014--Dumb ass.
1015--Dumb ass?
1016--Dumas. I Know what that's about?
1017--You'd like it. It's about a prison break.
1018--We ought to file that under "Educational" too, oughtn't we?
1019--The rest of us did our best to pitch in when and where we could.
1020--By the year Kennedy was shot
1021--Andy had transformed a storage room smelling of turpentine
1022--into the best prison library in New England
1023--complete with a fine selection of Hank Williams.
1024--That was also when Warden Norton
1025--instituted his famous "Inside Out" program.
1026--You may remember reading about it.
1027--It made the papers and got his picture in Look magazine.
1028--It's no free ride
1029--but rather a genuine progressive advance
1030--in corrections and rehabilitation.
1031--Our inmates, properly supervised
1032--will be put to work outside these walls
1033--performing all manner of public service.
1034--These men can learn the value
1035--of an honest day's labor and provide a service to the community
1036--at a bare minimum of expense to Mr. And Mrs. John Q. Taxpayer.
1037--Of course he didn't tell the press
1038--that "bare minimum of expense" is a fairly loose term.
1039--There are 100 different ways to skim off the top.
1040--Men, materials, you name it.
1041--And oh, my Lord, how the money rolled in!
1042--At this rate, you'll put me out of business.
1043--With this pool of slave labor, you can underbid any contractor in town.
1044--We're providing a valuable community service.
1045--That's fine for the papers, but I've got a family to feed.
1046--We go back a long way.
1047--I need this highway contract. I don't get it and I go under. That's a fact.
1048--You have some of this fine pie
1049--my missus made for you. You think about that.
1050--I wouldn't worry too much about this contract.
1051--I already got my boys committed elsewhere.
1052--You be sure and thank Maisie for this fine pie.
1053--And behind every shady deal
1054--behind every dollar earned
1055--there was Andy, keeping the books.
1056--Two deposits.

1057--Maine National and New England First. Night drops as always, sir.
1058--Get my stuff to the laundry. Two suits for dry-clean and a bag of whatnot.
1059---If they over-starch my shirts again, they'll hear from me.-Yes Sir.
1060--How do I look?
1061---Very nice. -Big charity to-do up Portland way.
1062--Governor will be there.
1063--You want the rest of this?
1064--Woman can't bake worth shit.
1065--Thank you, sir.
1066--He's got his fingers in a lot of pies, from what I hear.
1067--He's got scams you haven't even dreamed of. IKickbacks on his kickbacks.
1068--A river of dirty money running through here.
1069--Sooner or later, he'll have to explain where it came from.
1070--That's where I come in.
1071--I channel it. Filter it. Funnel it.
1072--Stocks, securities, tax-free municipals.
1073--I send it out into the real world, and when it comes back
1074---Clean as a virgin's honeypot, huh? -Cleaner.
1075--By the time Norton retires, I'll have made him a millionaire.
1076--If they ever catch on, he'll wind up in here wearing a number himself.
1077--I thought you had more faith in me than that.
1078--I know you're good, but all that paper leaves a trail.
1079--Now anybody gets curious, FBI, IRS
1080--whatever.
1081--It'll lead to somebody.
1082--Sure it is, but not to me, and certainly not to the warden.
1083--All right, who?
1084--Randall Stevens.
1085--Who?
1086--The "silent" silent partner.
1087--He's the guilty one, the man with the bank accounts.
1088--It's where the filtering process starts.
1089--They trace anything, it'll just lead to him.
1090--But who is he?
1091--He's a phantom, an apparition. Second cousin to Harvey the Rabbit.
1092--I conjured him
1093--out of thin air.
1094--He doesn't exist, except on paper.
1095--You can't just make a person up.
1096--Sure you can, if you know how the system works.
1097--It's amazing what you can accomplish by mail.
1098--Mr. Stevens has a birth certificate
1099--driver's license, Social Security.
1100--You're shitting me.

1101--If they trace any accounts, they'll wind up chasing
1102--a figment of my imagination.
1103--Well, I'll be damned!
1104--Did I say you were good?
1105--Shit, you are Rembrandt.
1106--The funny thing is
1107--on the outside, I was an honest man, straight as an arrow.
1108--I had to come to prison to be a crook.
1109--Ever bother you?
1110--I don't run the scams.I just process the profits.
1111--A fine line, maybe
1112--but I also built that library
1113--and used it to help guys get their high school diploma.
1114--Why do you think he lets me do all that?
1115--IKeep you happy and doing the laundry.
1116--Money instead of sheets.
1117--Well, I work cheap. That's the tradeoff.
1118--Tommy Williams came to Shawshank in 1965
1119--on a two-year stretch for B and E.
1120--That's breaking and entering to you.
1121--Cops caught him sneaking TV sets out the back door of a JC Penney.
1122--Young punk.
1123--Mr. Rock 'n' Roll
1124--cocky as hell.
1125--Come on, old boys. Moving like molasses!
1126--Making me look bad.
1127--We liked him immediately.
1128--I'm backing out the door and I got the TV like this.
1129--A big old thing. I couldn't see shit. Then I hear this voice.
1130--"Freeze, kid, hands in the air."
1131--I was standing there, holding onto that TV. Finally the voice says:
1132--"You hear what I said, boy?" I say, "Yes, sir. I did.
1133--But if I drop this, you get me on destruction of property too."
1134--You done some stretch in Cashman, right?
1135--Yeah, that was an easy piece of time, let me tell you.
1136--Weekend furloughs. Work programs.
1137--Not like here.
1138--Sounds like you done time all over.
1139--I've been in and out since I was 13.
1140--Name it, chances are I've been there.
1141--Perhaps you should try a new profession.
1142--What I mean is
1143--you're not a very good thief.You should try something else.
1144--Yeah, what the hell you know about it, Capone?

1145--What are you in for?

1146--Me?

1147--A lawyer fucked me.

1148--Everybody's innocent in here. Don't you know that?

1149--As it turned out, Tommy had himself a young wife and a new baby girl.

1150--Maybe he thought of them on the streets

1151--or his child growing up not knowing her daddy.

1152--Whatever it was

1153--something lit a fire under that boy's ass.

1154--Thought I might try for my high school equivalency.

1155--Hear you helped a couple of fellas with that.

1156--I don't waste time with losers, Tommy.

1157--I ain't no goddamn loser.

1158---You mean that? -Yeah.

1159--You really mean that?

1160--Yes, sir, I do.

1161--Good. Because if we do this

1162--we do it all the way, a hundred percent, nothing half-assed.

1163--Thing is, see

1164--I don't read so good.

1165--"Well."

1166--You don't read

1167--so well.

1168--We'll get to that.

1169--So Andy took Tommy under his wing.

1170--Started walking him through his ABC's.

1171--Tommy took to it pretty well too.

1172--Boy found brains he never knew he had.

1173--Before long, Andy started him on his course requirements.

1174--He really liked the kid.

1175--Gave him a thrill to help a youngster crawl off the shit heap.

1176--But that wasn't the only reason.

1177--Prison time is slow time.

1178--So you do what you can to keep going.

1179--Some fellas collect stamps.

1180--Others build matchstick houses.

1181--Andy built a library.

1182--Now he needed a new project.

1183--Tommy was it.

1184--It was the same reason he spent years shaping and polishing those rocks.

1185--The same reason he hung his fantasy girlies on the wall.

1186--In prison

1187--a man will do most anything to keep his mind occupied.

1188--By 1966, right about the time Tommy was getting ready to take his exams

1189--it was lovely Raquel.
1190--Time.
1191--Well?
1192--Well, it's for shit.
1193--I wasted a whole year of my time with this bullshit.
1194--It's probably not that bad.
1195--I didn't get a thing right.It might as well have been in Chinese.
1196--Let's see how the score comes out.
1197--I'll tell you how the goddamn score comes out.
1198--Two points, right there!
1199--There's your goddamn score!
1200--Goddamn cats crawling up trees,5 times 5 is 25
1201--Fuck this place!
1202--Fuck it!
1203--I feel bad.
1204--I let him down.
1205--That's crap, kid.
1206--He's proud of you.
1207--We're old friends,I know him as good as anybody.
1208--Smart fellow, ain't he?
1209--Smart as they come. He was a banker on the outside.
1210--What's he in here for anyway?
1211--Murder.
1212--The hell, you say.
1213--You wouldn't think it to look at the guy.
1214--Caught his wife in bed with some golf pro. Greased them both.
1215--What?
1216--About four years ago
1217--I was in Thomaston on a two-to-three stretch.
1218--I stole a car.
1219--It was a dumb-fuck thing to do.
1220--About six months left to go
1221--I get a new cellmate in.
1222--Elmo Blatch.
1223--Big, twitchy fucker.
1224--IKind of roomie you pray you don't get. You know what I'm saying?
1225--Six-to-twelve, armed burglary.
1226--Said he pulled hundreds of jobs.
1227--Hard to believe, high-strung as he was.You cut a loud fart, he jumped three feet.
1228--Talked all the time too. That's the other thing. He never shut up.
1229--Places he'd been in
1230--jobs he'd pulled, women he fucked.
1231--Even people he killed.
1232--People who "gave him shit."

1233--That's how he put it.
1234--So one night, like a joke
1235--I say to him,"Elmo, who did you kill?"
1236--So he says:
1237--I got me this job one time,busing tables at a country club
1238--so I could case all these bigrich pricks that come in.
1239--So I pick out this guy
1240--go in one night
1241--and do his place.
1242--He wakes up
1243--and gives me shit.
1244--So I killed him.
1245--Him and this tasty bitch he was with.
1246--And that's the best part.
1247--She's fucking this prick, see
1248--this golf pro,but she's married to some other guy.
1249--Some hotshot banker.
1250--And he's the one they pinned it on.
1251--I have to say that's the most amazing story I ever heard.
1252--What amazes me most is you'd be taken in by it.
1253--Sir?
1254--It's obvious this fellow Williams is impressed with you.
1255--He hears your tale of woe and naturally wants to cheer you up.
1256--He's young, not terribly bright.
1257--It's not surprising he wouldn't know what a state he put you in.
1258--Sir, he's telling the truth.
1259--Let's say for the moment this Blatch does exist.
1260--You think he'd just fall to his knees and cry, "Yes, I did it. I confess.
1261--By the way, add a life term to my sentence."
1262--With Tommy's testimony,I can get a new trial.
1263--That's assuming Blatch is still there.
1264--Chances are, he'd be released by now.
1265--They'd have his last known address.It's a chance, isn't it?
1266--How can you be so obtuse?
1267--What?
1268--What did you call me?
1269--Obtuse. Is it deliberate?
1270--You're forgetting yourself.
1271--The country club will have his old timecards.
1272--Records, W-2s with his name on them.
1273--If you want to indulge this fantasy,it's your business.
1274--Don't make it mine.This meeting is over.
1275--If I got out, I'd never mentionwhat happens here.
1276--I'd be as indictable as you for laundering that money.

1277--Don't ever mention money to me,you son of a bitch!
1278--Not in this office
1279--not anywhere.Get in here, now!
1280--I just wanted to put you at ease,that's all.
1281---Solitary. A month. -Yes sir.
1282---what's wrong with you? -Get him out of here.
1283--This is my chance to get out! It's my life! Understand?!
1284--Get him out!
1285--A month in the hole.
1286--That's the longest stretch I ever heard of.
1287--It's all my fault.
1288--Bullshit.
1289--You didn't pull the trigger or convict him.
1290--Are you saying Andy is innocent?
1291--I mean, for real innocent?
1292--It looks that way.
1293--Sweet Jesus.
1294--How long has he been here now?
1295--1947. What is that? Nineteen years.
1296---Williams, Tommy. -Yeah, over here.
1297--What you got?
1298--Board of Education.
1299--That son of a bitch mailed it.
1300--You going to open it or stand there with your thumb up your butt?
1301--Thumb up my butt sounds better.
1302--Skeets, come on.Give me that, you shithead.
1303--Floyd, come on.
1304--Red
1305--Will you throw that away, please?
1306--Well, shit.
1307--The kid passed. C + average.
1308--Thought you'd like to know.
1309--Warden wants to talk.
1310--Out here?
1311--That's what the man said.
1312--Warden?
1313--Tommy.
1314--I'm asking you to keep this conversation just between us.
1315--I feel awkward enough as it is.
1316--We got a situation here.
1317--I think you can appreciate that.
1318--Yes, sir.
1319--I sure can.
1320--I tell you, son, this thing really came along and knocked my wind out.

1321--It's got me up nights.That's the truth.
1322--The right thing to do
1323--sometimes it's hard to know what that is.
1324--Do you understand?
1325--I need your help, son.
1326--If I'm going to move on this
1327--there can't be the least little shred of doubt.
1328--I have to know
1329--if what you told Dufresne was the truth.
1330--Yes, sir.
1331--Absolutely.
1332--Would you be willing to swear before a judge and jury
1333--with your hand on the Good Book
1334--and take an oath before Almighty God himself?
1335--Just give me that chance.
1336--That's what I thought.
1337--I'm sure by now you've heard.
1338--Terrible thing.
1339--A man that young
1340--less than a year to go, trying to escape.
1341--Broke Captain Hadley's heart to shoot him.
1342--Truly, it did.
1343--We just have to put it behind us.
1344--Move on.
1345--I'm done.
1346--Everything stops.
1347--Get someone else to run your scams.
1348--Nothing stops.
1349--Nothing.
1350--Or you will do the hardest time there is.
1351--No more protection from the guards.
1352--I'll pull you out of that 1 -bunk Hilton and cast you down with the sodomites.
1353--You'll think you've been fucked by a train.
1354--And the library?
1355--Gone.
1356--Sealed off, brick by brick.
1357--We'll have us a little book barbecue in the yard.
1358--They'll see the flames for miles.
1359--We'll dance around it like wild Injuns.
1360--You understand me? Catching my drift?
1361--Or am I being obtuse?
1362--Give him another month to think about it.
1363--My wife used to say I'm a hard man to know.

1366--She was beautiful.
1367--God, I loved her.
1368--I didn't know how to show it, that's all.
1369--I killed her, Red.
1370--I didn't pull the trigger
1371--but I drove her away.
1372--That's why she died, because of me
1373--the way I am.
1374--That don't make you a murderer.
1375--Bad husband, maybe.
1376--Feel bad about it if you want,but you didn't pull the trigger.
1377--No, I didn't.
1378--Somebody else did.
1379--And I wound up in here.
1380--Bad luck, I guess.
1381--It floats around.
1382--It's got to land on somebody.
1383--It was my turn, that's all.
1384--I was in the path of the tornado.
1385--I just didn't expect the storm would last as long as it has.
1386--Think you'll ever get out of here?
1387--Me?
1388--Yeah.
1389--One day, when I got a long, white beard
1390--and two or three marbles rolling around upstairs.
1391--I tell you where I'd go.
1392--Zihuatanejo.
1393--Say what?
1394--Zihuatanejo.
1395--It's in Mexico.
1396--A little place on the Pacific Ocean.
1397---You know what the Mexicans say about the Pacific? -No
1398--They say it has no memory.
1399--That's where I want to live the rest of my life.
1400--A warm place with no memory.
1401--Open up a little hotel
1402--right on the beach.
1403--Buy some worthless old boat
1404--and fix it up new.
1405--Take my guests out
1406--charter fishing.
1407--Zihuatanejo.
1408--In a place like that, I could use a man that knows how to get things.

1409--I don't think I could make it on the outside.
1410--I been in here most of my life.
1411--I'm an institutional man now.
1412--Just like Brooks was.
1413--You underestimate yourself.
1414--I don't think so.
1415--In here I'm the guy who can get things for you, sure, but
1416--outside all you need is the Yellow Pages.
1417--Hell, I wouldn't know where to begin.
1418--Pacific Ocean?
1419--Shit.
1420--Scare me to death, something that big.
1421--Not me.
1422--I didn't shoot my wife,and I didn't shoot her lover.
1423--Whatever mistakes I made,I've paid for them and then some.
1424--That hotel, that boat
1425--I don't think that's too much to ask.
1426--You shouldn't be doing this to yourself.
1427--This is just shitty pipe dreams.
1428--Mexico is way down there and you're in here
1429--and that's the way it is.
1430--Yeah, right.That's the way it is.
1431--It's down there and I'm in here.
1432--I guess it comes down to a simple choice.
1433--Get busy living
1434--or get busy dying.
1435--Andy
1436--Red
1437--If you ever get out of here,do me a favor.
1438--Sure, Andy. Anything.
1439--There's a big hayfield up near Buxton.You know where Buxton is?
1440---A lot of hayfields up there. -One in particular.
1441--It's got a long rock wall with a big oak tree at the north end.
1442--It's like something out of a Robert Frost poem.
1443--It's where I asked my wife to marry me.
1444--We went there for a picnic
1445--and made love under that oak
1446--and I asked and she said yes.
1447--Promise me, Red.
1448--If you ever get out
1449--find that spot.
1450--At the base of that wall, there's a rock that has no earthly business in Maine.
1451--Piece of black, volcanic glass.
1452--Something's buried under it I want you to have.

1453--What, Andy?
1454--What's buried under there?
1455--You'll have to pry it up
1456--to see.
1457--No, I'm telling you. The guy is
1458--He's talking funny.
1459--I'm really worried about him.
1460--Let's keep an eye on him.
1461--That's fine during the day,but at night he's all alone.
1462--Oh, Lord.
1463--What?
1464--Andy come down to the loading dock today.
1465--He asked me for a length of rope.
1466---Rope? -Six feet long.
1467--And you gave it to him.
1468--Sure. Why wouldn't I?
1469---Jesus! Heywood. -How was I supposed to know?
1470--Remember Brooks Hatlen?
1471--Andy would never do that.
1472--Never.
1473--I don't know.
1474--Every man has his breaking point.
1475--Lickety-split.Want to get home.
1476--Just about finished, sir.
1477--Three deposits tonight.
1478--Get my stuff down to the laundry.
1479--And shine my shoes.
1480---I want them looking like mirrors. -Yes, sir.
1481--It's good having you back.
1482--Place wasn't the same without you.
1483--Lights out!
1484--I've had some long nights in stir.
1485--Alone in the dark with nothing but your thoughts
1486--time can draw out like a blade.
1487--That was the longest night of my life.
1488--Give me a count!
1489---Tier 3 south, -clear!
1490--Man missing on tier 2, cell 245!
1491--Dufresne!
1492--Come out. You're holding up the show!
1493--Don't make me come down or I'll thump your skull for you!
1494--Damn it, you're putting me behind!I got a schedule to keep.
1495--You'd better be sick or dead in there.I shit you not!
1496--You hear me?

1497--Oh, my Holy God.
1498--I want every man on this cellblock questioned.
1499---Start with that friend of his. -Who?
1500--him
1501--Open 237.
1502--What do you mean, "He just wasn't here"? Don't say that to me.
1503--Don't tell me that again.
1504--But sir, he wasn't.
1505--I can see that, Haig! Think I'm blind?
1506--Is that what you're saying?
1507---Am I blind, Haig? -No, sir!
1508--What about you. You blind?
1509---Tell me what this is. -Last night's count.
1510--You see Dufresne's name there? I sure do. Right there.
1511--"Dufresne."
1512--He was in his cell
1513--at lights out.
1514--Reasonable he'd be here in the morning.
1515--I want him found.
1516--Not tomorrow, not after breakfast. Now!
1517--Yes, sir.
1518--Let's go. Move your butts.
1519--Stand.
1520--Well?
1521--Well, what?
1522--I see you two all the time. You're thick as thieves, you are.
1523--He must have said something.
1524--No, sir, Warden.
1525--Not a word.
1526--Lord, it's a miracle!
1527--Man vanished like a fart in the wind.
1528--Nothing left
1529--but some damn rocks on a windowsill.
1530--And that cupcake on the wall. Let's ask her.
1531--Maybe she knows.
1532--What say there, fuzzy-britches? Feel like talking?
1533--Guess not.
1534--Why should she be any different?
1535--This is a conspiracy.
1536--That's what this is.
1537--One big, damn conspiracy!
1538--And everyone's in on it!
1539--Including her!
1540--In 1966

1541--Andy Dufresne escaped
1542--from Shawshank Prison.
1543--All they found was a muddy set of prison clothes
1544--a bar of soap
1545--and an old rock hammer
1546--damn near worn down to the nub.
1547--I had thought it'd take a man 600 years to tunnel through the wall with it.
1548--Old Andy did it in less than 20.
1549--Oh, Andy loved geology.
1550--I imagine it appealed to his meticulous nature.
1551--An ice age here
1552--million years of mountain building there.
1553--Geology is the study of pressure and time.
1554--That's all it takes, really.
1555--Pressure
1556--and time.
1557--That and a big goddamn poster.
1558--Like I said
1559--in prison, a man will do anything to keep his mind occupied.
1560--Seems Andy's favorite hobby was toting his wall out into the exercise yard
1561--a handful at a time.
1562--I guess after Tommy was killed
1563--Andy decided he'd been here long enough.
1564--Lickety-split.I want to get home.
1565--I'm just about finished, sir.
1566--Three deposits tonight.
1567--Andy did like he was told.
1568--Buffed those shoes to a high mirror-shine.
1569--The guards simply didn't notice.
1570--Neither did I.
1571--I mean, seriously
1572--how often do you really look at a man's shoes?
1573--Andy crawled to freedom through 500 yards
1574--of shit-smelling foulness I can't even imagine.
1575--Or maybe I just don't want to.
1576--Five hundred yards.
1577--That's the length of five football fields.
1578--Just shy of half a mile.
1579--The next morning, right about the time Raquel was spilling her secret
1580--a man nobody ever laid eyes on before
1581--strolled into the Maine National Bank.
1582--Until that moment, he didn't exist.
1583---Except on paper. -May I help you?
1584--He had all the proper ID

1585--driver's license, birth certificate, Social Security card
1586--And the signature was a spot-on match.
1587--I must say I'm sorry to be losing your business.
1588--I hope you'll enjoy living abroad.
1589--Thank you.
1590--I'm sure I will.
1591--Here's your cashier's check, sir. Will there be anything else?
1592--Please.
1593--Would you add this to your outgoing mail?
1594--I'd be happy to.
1595---Good day, sir. -Good day.
1596--Mr. Stevens visited nearly a dozen banks in the Portland area that morning.
1597--All told, he blew town
1598--with better than \$370,000 of Warden Norton's money.
1599--Severance pay for 19 years.
1600--Good morning, Portland Daily Bugle.
1601--Corruption, Murder at Shawshank
1602--His Judgement Cometh and that Right Soon.
1603--Dear warden, you are right, salvation lay within. Andy Dufresne
1604--Byron Hadley? You have the right to remain silent.
1605--If you give up this right, anything you say can be held against you in court.
1606--I wasn't there to see, but I hear Byron Hadley sobbed like a girl
1607--when they took him away.
1608--Norton had no intention of going that quietly.
1609--Samuel Norton.
1610--We have a warrant for your arrest. Open up.
1611--Open the door.
1612--I'm not sure which key.
1613--Make it easy on yourself, Norton!
1614--I like to think the last thing that went through his head
1615--other than that bullet
1616--was to wonder how the hell Andy Dufresne ever got the best of him.
1617--Not long after the warden deprived us of his company
1618--I got a postcard in the mail.
1619--It was blank, but the postmark said
1620--Fort Hancock, Texas.
1621--Fort Hancock
1622--right on the border.
1623--That's where Andy crossed.
1624--When I picture him heading south in his own car with the top down
1625--it always makes me laugh.
1626--Andy Dufresne
1627--who crawled through a river of shit
1628--and came out clean on the other side.

1629--Andy Dufresne
1630--headed for the Pacific.
1631--Hadley's got him by the throat, right?
1632--He says, "I believe this boy's about to have himself an accident."
1633--Those of us who knew him best talk about him often.
1634--I swear, the stuff he pulled
1635--"My friends could use a couple of beers."
1636--And he got it!
1637--Sometimes it makes me sad, though
1638--Andy being gone.
1639--I have to remind myself that some birds aren't meant to be caged.
1640--Their feathers are just too bright.
1641--And when they fly away
1642--the part of you that knows it was a sin to lock them up does rejoice.
1643--But still
1644--the place you live in is that much more drab and empty that they're gone.
1645--I guess I just miss my friend.
1646--Please sit down.
1647--Ellis Boyd Redding
1648--your files say you've served 40 years of a life sentence.
1649--You feel you've been rehabilitated?
1650--Rehabilitated?
1651--Well, now, let me see.
1652--I don't have any idea what that means.
1653--It means you're ready to rejoin society
1654--I know what you think it means, sonny.
1655--To me it's just a made-up word.
1656--A politician's word so that
1657--young fellas like yourself can wear a suit and a tie
1658--and have a job.
1659--What do you really want to know?
1660--Am I sorry for what I did?
1661--Well, are you?
1662--There's not a day goes by I don't feel regret.
1663--Not because I'm in here or because you think I should.
1664--I look back on the way I was then
1665--a young
1666--stupid kid who committed that terrible crime.
1667--I want to talk to him.
1668--I want to try and talk some sense to him.
1669--Tell him the way things are.
1670--But I can't.
1671--That kid's long gone
1672--and this old man is all that's left.

1673--I got to live with that.
1674--Rehabilitated?
1675--It's just a bullshit word.
1676--So you go on and stamp your forms,sonny, and stop wasting my time.
1677--Because to tell you the truth
1678--I don't give a shit.
1679--Approved
1680--Brooks was here.
1681--Here you go, miss.
1682--Restroom break?
1683--You don't need to ask me every time you need to go take a piss. Just go.
1684--yes
1685--Forty years I've been asking permission to piss.
1686--I can't squeeze a drop without say-so.
1687--There's a harsh truth to face.
1688--No way I'm going to make it on the outside.
1689--All I do anymore is think of ways to break my parole
1690--so maybe they'd send me back.
1691--Terrible thing, to live in fear.
1692--Brooks Hatlen knew it.
1693--Knew it all too well.
1694--All I want is to be back where things make sense.
1695--Where I won't have to be afraid all the time.
1696--Only one thing stops me.
1697--A promise I made to Andy.
1698--There it is.
1699--Much obliged, sir.
1700--Buxton
1701--Dear Red:
1702--If you're reading this,you've gotten out
1703--and if you've come this far,maybe you'd come a bit further.
1704--You remember the name of the town, don't you?
1705--Zihuatanejo.
1706--I could use a good man to help me get my project on wheels.
1707--I'll keep an eye out for you,and the chessboard ready.
1708--Remember, Red
1709--hope is a good thing
1710--maybe the best of things.
1711--And no good thing ever dies.
1712--I will be hoping that this letter finds you
1713--and finds you well.
1714--Your friend
1715--Andy.
1716--"Get busy living

1717--or get busy dying."

1718--That's goddamn right.

1719--Brooks was here. So was Red.

1720--For the second time in my life

1721--I'm guilty of committing a crime.

1722--Parole violation.

1723--Of course I doubt they'll toss up any roadblocks for that.

1724--Not for an old crook like me.

1725--Fort Hancock, Texas, please.

1726--I find I'm so excited I can barely sit still or hold a thought in my head.

1727--I think it's the excitement only a free man can feel.

1728--A free man at the start of a long journey

1729--whose conclusion is uncertain.

1730--I hope I can make it across the border.

1731--I hope to see my friend and shake his hand.

1732--I hope the Pacific is as blue as it has been in my dreams.

1733--I hope.
